I. Call to Order, Cindy Brown, Chairperson, at 9:33AM. Cindy asked for introductions from those present. Any member(s) attending virtually either stated their physical location on the record or typed the information in the public chat box.

Mike O'Connor attended virtually from Douglas, Michigan.

#### II. Purpose of the committee

To assist the WDB in facilitating and building a collaborative partnership between employers, labor, workforce development advocates, local school districts, postsecondary institutions, and training centers to identify and collectively develop and implement training strategies that effectively address Michigan employers' talent needs.

III. Review Previous Meeting Notes & Action Items

Motion – Rich Franklin Second – Kyle Fiebig Item Approved by Vote – Motion carried

#### IV. MiSTEM Updates

Ginger Rohwer (MiSTEM Network) reported that MiSTEM will have a Michigan Career Education Conference and will also be a presenter. They just launched the first round of their STEM mini grant cycle. This summer they are launching an advanced manufacturing camp. Finally, they are submitting an article to Michigan Manufacturers' Association.

- V. Regional Grant Updates CTE regional representatives
  - Review of Comprehensive Local Needs Assessments by CEPD/Perkins regions Cary Stamas
     Cary Stamas (Kent ISD) explained this is an annual event that is part of Perkins V. They are
     tasked with getting feedback on how to apply Perkins funds. Input is being gathered here and
     from other sources. Every two years they are required to obtain this feedback. All the feedback

comes together at the CEPD level for regional consideration. A question to consider is whether or not there are regional trends or changes in industries. Cary brought up the example of retirements. How do we continue to expand where we can, and how do we provide experiences students can transition into pathways that are most beneficial to them and responsive to the needs of the region? He mentioned the difficulty that exists finding qualified CTE instructors without stealing from another region, which means they are now competing with industry.

Kyle Fiebig (Muskegon Area ISD) described the approach of looking within to look outward. Seventy-five percent turnover could happen at the end of this school year. They are looking at industry partners for recruitment in order to not steal from other regions. Partnerships will be key to having more student work-based experiences. Industry partners have told them they need to start earlier, so they are looking at middle school programs.

Rich Okoniewski (Allegan County Technical & Education Center) discussed increasing work-based learning opportunities is the key. They are struggling with the placement of students in enrolled programs, and also need to figure out how to meet employer needs with such barriers. They are attempting to address at-risk students who start in a CTE curriculum and struggle in their program. Review programming — make sure they are relative to the needs of their region. Also, they are looking into how to review a program to know if it is sustainable and are trying to come up with a validity process to evaluate program.

Dave Searles (Careerline Tech Center – Ottawa) discussed creating a transition-type program for students not doing well in CTE programs or who need something different. They have strengthened EL support and are expanding career exploration across the region.

#### VII. Region 4 Adult Education Program Update – Patricia Walstra

Patricia Walstra (Kent ISD – Adult Ed) provided a handout [see attachment]. There is a group of partners who have come together for adult education. There are two primary funding sources: WIOA & Section 107 (Section 107 is primarily what Patricia oversees for region 4). Special programs through Section 107 links adult education, CTE centers, employers, and the local Michigan Works! Agency. There are nine awards across the state, and Region 4 has four of the nine awards, which is significant. Services are being provided both in person and remote. They have had to decentralize; they took programs out to the students instead of expecting the students to come to the centers.

#### VIII. Access for All Program – Ryan Bennett

Ryan Bennett (U.A. Local #174) discussed the Access For All flyer included in the packet. This addresses the diversity issue that exists because people do not know the opportunities available to them. Two cohorts will be starting in Muskegon & Kent counties. Participants must have reliable transportation and must be able to pass the drug test. Wraparound services will be available to help with barriers they may face. This is a nine week course.

Ginger Rohwer (MiSTEM Netowork) discussed the Trade Up program. This is a summer pilot program for middle school students being run by the Kalamazoo MiSTEM region. This may be offered in this region.

#### Service Center Operations

Angie Barksdale (West Michigan Works!):

West Michigan Works! Is transitioning to new work locations and has instituted a remote work policy. There has been an increase in walk-in traffic of around 30% at service centers. Services will continue to be offered virtually as well. There are two new buildings in Ionia and Holland. Ionia will have more visibility to the public and will double the current space. Holland will be located closer to GRCC's new campus. Both locations will allow for increased collaboration and partnership. There are two director positions open: Director of Innovation & Development and Talent Solutions Director. Brittany Lenertz's last day is today.

#### Grants

Angie Barksdale:

There are not many updates from the previous meeting, so attendees can refer to the minutes from the previous meeting. West Michigan Works! is applying as a co-applicant with GRCC for the EDA Good Jobs Challenge grant. The focus is on systems: Where are there gaps? Where should work be done where it currently is not being done? If awarded, West Michigan Works! will focus on building the capacity of industry councils, working with schools, and career pathways work. Also, talent pipelines will be a focus. There would be a pot of dollars for CBOs to connect to pathways for those in their communities. This will allow people to connect in their communities where they feel comfortable instead of having to go to West Michigan Works!. The nonprofit status of Strategic Workforce Solutions is official.

#### Amy Lebednick (West Michigan Works!):

Hot Jobs data has been vetted through the industry councils and is being finalized. Wages are up across the board. There will be one pathway map listed per job family on the Hot Jobs report. This will serve as a guide to job seekers and counselors. The goal is for the Hot Jobs to be released in February.

#### Programs/Initiatives

Amy Lebednick:

For MiCareerQuest, West Michigan Works! is looking at providing career exploration materials to schools – MiCareerExploration. ISDs have communicated excitement about this. The event may be capped off with a virtual job fair for high school seniors in May. For Going PRO Talent Fund, West Michigan Works! received just over \$14 million for almost 300 employer awardees. The ILC application will open on February 1. The apprenticeship department has been formalized. West Michigan Works! is seeking approval for an EEG Tech program. This would be first such program in the nation.

#### X. CEAC Metric Updates

Cindy Brown referenced updates on the CEAC metrics.

#### XI. Council Member Activities/Initiatives

Cary Stamas (Kent ISD): They are changing their delivery model on how they are interacting. They are spending 75% of their times working w/s pecific districts, aligning to their school improvement plan and working on a systematic implementation of career readiness and exploration in K-12.

Kyle Fiebig (Muskegon Area ISD): They have split their Career Specialist by grade levels and appreciate the partnerships for virtual job fairs and the Linked program.

Rich Franklin (Barry ISD): Barry County overlaps regions and their CPED is different, so he does not have specific information to share. However, if he can obtain data about their CLNA plan, he will share it with this group. They are working on a new public/private partnership for an EDA grant. The SBA shared information about Mi Hidden Talent which is sponsored by DTE, Consumer's Energy, and Meijer.

This event on March 14 is employer-focused and is about the inclusion of people with disabilities in the workforce. This information will be shared with this group.

Lisa Hungerford (Talent 2025): They will host each Tues in the month of March speakers, employer panels, and resources for educators. They are also looking at regionally aligning and expanding K-12 employability skillsets, using technology and competency-based learning that can be assessed and catalogued.

Rich Okoniewski (Allegan County Technical & Education Center): They will have an in-person open house February 8. There is a Perrigo summer internship for a set-up technician. This internship has grown over the last three years. It offers \$16.25 per hour and the hours are 10am-6pm.

Ginger Rohwer (MiSTEM Network): There is a collaborative that addresses how to develop students' identities as problem solvers. This is a long-term initiative. All are welcome to join the group. Contact Ginger if interested.

Dave Searles (Careerline Tech Center – Ottawa): They are running the Future Prep Academy throughout the year. There will be an open house held.

Chauncy Williams (Muskegon Public Schools): They are preparing to launch Career Deal for around 20 seniors at the end of February. This will include culinary, construction, IT, and CNA training. The program is sponsored by Connect Detroit.

Ryan Bennett (U.A. Local #174): Career Day will be back in person in March. This will kick off their application process for apprenticeship programs.

Amy Lebednick (West Michigan Works!): She will share the website links of West Michigan Works! industry councils so they will be in the meeting minutes in case anyone is interested in keeping up to date with what programs they are rolling out to students.


